his year the ISA will be extremely busy with providing

services and resources to 47 Newly Elected Sheriffs. Indiana is only 1 of 3 States where our Sheriffs are Term Limited to serving two four-year terms for a total of 8 years consecutive as the county sheriff. With 92 sheriffs statewide, we continue to have "One Voice "as the ISA and Indiana Sheriffs serve our ISA Members and citizens."

This year in 2023, we will continue to raise the bar here at the ISA. The ISA continues to invest in our ISA Members, especially in 2023. How are we doing this?

- 1. By creating quarterly ISA Newsletters that provide important content that will inform you as a member on what the ISA is involved in that will help your county Sheriff's offices in providing strong public safety. The ISA is heavily involved in making sure training and education is a primary goal for the Sheriff's Office. WE WANT YOUR SHERIFF'S OFFICE TO LEAD THE WAY!
  - 2. A strong presence at the Indiana State House. The ISA and Indiana Sheriffs will continue the communication between our legislators and citizens on the issues that need to be discussed. Passing sensible legislation is critical in "Building Communities of Trust." During the 2023

- Legislative Session, the ISA will continue to host "Super Tuesdays" at the state House. ISA will have a group of Sheriffs present to engage with their legislators and testify on bills that require a hearing each week.
- 3. New and Improved ISA Website!!!!

  The ISA Staff over the past few months has been working on conducting a website audit while incorporating additional work in making sure our messaging is at its best for our ISA Members and Non-Members. The ISA Website will have a new look with features that will allow it to be more user-friendly. The ISA feels that this is extremely important for our citizens in asking for their continued support and to offer resources throughout the website. The website will launch in the Spring of 2023.
- 4. Providing successful programs to our Law Enforcement Families and ISA Members will continue to be a high priority for the ISA. Over the past 40 years, the ISA College Scholarship Program has allowed 40 high school students of Law Enforcement Families the opportunity to attend college and study criminal justice and the ISA Youth Leadership Program has provided an opportunity to over 200 youths each summer to experience leadership and enhance the development of the state's youth.

# Spotlight on Sheriff Robert Goldsmith of Tippecanoe County

Sheriff Robert Goldsmith is a lifelong Tippecanoe County resident. If you live there, you know him—you've seen him coaching kids' sports or serving up the BBQ for community events. His heart for the

community is the reason he serves. He grew up here, wanting to be a police officer. He wants to be a difference maker.

When we first visited with Sheriff Goldsmith back in 2019, he was new to his post, just elected to his first term as Tippecanoe County Sheriff. He talked then about his desire to see the entire department become more involved in the community, building relationships of trust and respect with the citizens they serve. We talked about his department's growing social media presence and improving communication with residents. But he also looked ahead—things that he saw as needing attention to improve the way the Sheriff's Office operates and special areas that warranted focus—the jail, training, and the need for updating equipment and resources to help his department function more effectively and efficiently. Today, as Sheriff Goldsmith begins his second term, we're thrilled to look back and share some of the progress he's made in these key areas.

Where the jail is concerned, Sheriff Goldsmith's focus was on improving inmate and staff safety and reducing recidivism rates. On the matter of safety, a Quick Response Team was formed, and a routine was established for K9s to search for contraband in 2019. A merit lieutenant and sergeant were added to the jail staff in 2021. A number of programs were added to address mental health needs, and an agreement was made with Valley Oaks to assist in the administration of recovery medications for inmates in recovery. Programs were implemented in partnership with the West Lafayette Public Library and members of the community to provide books for inmates, and a data sharing agreement was struck with Purdue University to create a predictive model intended to guide the incarcerated into the right channels as they return home. The Tippecanoe Recovery Support Team began supplying recovery information and resources to inmates as they're being released—all working to reduce recidivism rates and help people succeed.

On the department resource side, Sheriff Goldsmith was able to add a deputy to the drug task force, two

additional SROs, and three crisis negotiators to the team. Two K9s were added (and one reassigned) to bring the total number of K9s to four. Two unmarked Chargers were added to the fleet. The property room and sexual offender registry position was filled by a civilian, freeing up two more detectives. New polygraph equipment, monitors for dispatch, and stab-rated body armor were also added.

New training programs have been implemented, including two launched by TCSD officers. Lt. Frantz got TCSD approved to host jail officer training school, which is a big cost savings to the county. Sgt. Waibel completed a shoot house project—the only one in the area—offering simulation training and room clearing exercises for SROs and other law enforcement professionals.

And all the while, Sheriff Goldsmith and his team continue to build bridges into the community. Saferwatch was contracted to supply a 2-way communication notification and alert system that allows the public to receive push notifications and submit tips via an app on their cell phones. The department also began a partnership with the Autism Society of Indiana to both train and assist with interactions officers might have with those who are non-verbal.

In all, it's been a very busy—and productive—first term for Sheriff Goldsmith. And there is much to look forward to as he begins his second as Sheriff of Tippecanoe County. We salute the efforts of Sheriff Goldsmith and his entire team. We're also thankful, because in addition to all this great work he's doing in Tippecanoe County, Sheriff Goldsmith has continued to be an invaluable contributor to the work of your ISA—serving this year as our treasurer.

#### What is National Police Week?

In 1962, President Kennedy proclaimed May 15 as National Peace Officers Memorial Day and the calendar week in which May 15 falls as National Police Week. Established by a joint resolution of Congress in 1962, National Police Week pays special recognition to those law enforcement officers who

have lost their lives in the line of duty for the safety and protection of others. Amended in 1994, President Bill Clinton signed Public Law 103-322, directing the flag of the United States shall be flown at half-staff on May 15.

National Police Week ceremonies and events, both locally and nationally, are a collaborative effort of many organizations dedicated to honoring America's law enforcement community.

The Indiana Sheriffs' Association stands in solidarity with and support of the families and loved ones of all law enforcement officers lost in the line of duty, especially the beloved men and women who've served in our communities.

5. Professionalism- The ISA promotes Leadership in the Sheriff's Office and continues to invest into our On-Line Learning Management System that is used by our Sheriffs and their employees statewide. The ISA Institute for Credible Leadership Development (ICLD) offers 186hrs of Leadership that each employee can access. When completed, the employee receives ILEA Training Credits. This year, the ISA will continue it's partnership with The National Command and Staff College by adding the West Point Leadership Academy. # Tornado Season Preparation & Storm Shelter Checklist

Tornado Safety Tips

Thile tornados can occur year-round in Indiana, we're most likely to see tornadic weather between May and July. Keeping yourself and your loved ones safe comes down to having preparations in place, staying alert to weather conditions, and knowing the best places to shelter. Your Indiana Sheriffs' Association offers these safety and planning tips.

#### **Step 1: Storm season preparations**

You should be prepared, keeping the following items on hand in the event threatening weather approaches:

- Battery operated information sources, radio, tv or internet-enabled device to listen to the latest emergency information
- Plenty of fresh batteries, for the aforementioned devices as well as flashlights and such in the event of lengthy poweroutages
- A well-stocked emergency kit including water, non-perishable foods, and medications
- A file with important documents and telephone numbers readily accessible
- A family tornado plan, including safe shelter locations for all household members and pets, contacts, and communication plans

#### Step 2: Stay alert to weather conditions

You should stay aware of changing conditions in your area. Tune into local radio and tv stations or NOAA weather radio for real-time information.

Tornados can strike rapidly, with little or no warning. Be aware of the following weather signs, and if you observe any of these

conditions, take cover immediately and tune into NOAA radio:

- Dark or green-colored skies
- Large, dark, low-hanging cloud(s)
- Large hail
- Weather roar—like an approaching train

#### Step 3: Know where to safely shelter

Flying debris causes most injuries and death in tornados. While no place is ideal, some locations offer more safety than others.

- A storm shelter, the basement, or any underground location offers you the most safety
- Without a storm shelter or basement as an option, an interior hallway or closet someplace in the center of the home without windows—might be your best option
- Avoid sheltering in any room with windows
- Do not stay in a manufactured or mobile home
- If you are in an automobile, do not attempt to outrun the tornado, instead find the nearest sturdy building for shelter
- For added protection, get under something sturdy, cover yourself with blankets, sleeping bags or mattresses.

Why not take time on a bright sunny day, before storm season's approach, to create and review your household plan with everyone living in your home, especially children, to be sure everyone is prepared in the event an emergency approaches?



# **Your ISA and The State House**

Our Voice Being Heard by the Legislature

The 2023 Legislative Session began on January 9th. This year, ISA is working on some key legislation related to three main topics:

- 1. Mental Health
- 2. School Safety
- 3. The Indiana Training Academy

On mental health, ISA is working to create more options for the criminal justice system to deflect or defer individuals that have mental health and/or addiction issues so that they receive the needed treatment instead of being housed in a county jail.

Additionally, we are working to help build out the resources and infrastructure around the state so that we have locations for individuals to go to receive treatment.

On school safety, we are working to increase available grant dollars for schools and to mandate that every school has an immediate notification system and anonymous tip line.

For the training academy, we want to identify an ongoing and sustainable funding source so that the academy can operate as one of the nation's best.
